With 35 years since its re-establishment as a university based on the principles of Liberal Arts, VMU aims to bring together academic partners, social stakeholders, and policymakers in an international forum to discuss how the Idea of University is being altered along with the current technological and societal transformations:

- Should universities merely follow the immediate societal needs or transcend them by being a guide to a full-fledged and far-sighted advancement?
- How do universities withstand collisions with a bureaucratic desire to classify and cluster people and the world according to the preconceived schemes, and what scope is there for different Liberal Arts models?
- How does AI modify not only the forms of how we teach but also the content of what we teach in university study programmes, and how does the development in AI align with the nurturing of natural human creativity and entrepreneurial potential?

# **KEYNOTE PRESENTERS**

Nomeda & Gediminas Urbonas are artists, educators, and co-founders of Urbonas Studio, based in Cambridge, Massachusetts and Vilnius, Lithuania. Urbonas Studio is an interdisciplinary research platform that facilitates exchange amongst diverse nodes of knowledge production and artistic practice in pursuit of projects that transform civic spaces and collective imaginaries. The Studio collaborates with experts in different fields to develop practice-based models that allow participants—including their students—to develop artworks that merge new media, urbanism, social sciences, and pedagogy to critically address the transformation of civic space and ecology. Urbonas Studio has exhibited internationally at São Paulo, Berlin, Lyon, Gwangju, Busan, Taipei Biennales, Folkestone Triennial, Manifesta and Documenta exhibitions, including solo shows and curatorial projects at the National Gallery of Art in Vilnius, Venice Biennale, and MACBA Barcelona among others. Nomeda & Gediminas Urbonas conduct research and teach at the Art, Culture, and Technology (ACT) programme at MIT, USA, and are visiting professors at Vytautas Magnus University in Kaunas.
